With employee solicitation at least 95% complete (a few stragglers, people on layoff, illness, etc.) a total of \$12,320 has been pledged to the United Fund. This represents a 12% increase over last year's pledge. In addition, as is our usual custom, the welfare committee voted \$500 each to five additional local charities, namely the Cancer Fund, Heart Fund, Cripple Children, March of Dimes and the Tuberculosis Association.
