

#### **OPERATING A MACHINE**



Be dressed right when you work with moving machinery— a short sleeve shirt, no tie, gloves or rings on the hands. If hair is long, wear a cap or other hair covering. Avoid wearing loose or torn clothing. Always wear personal protective equipment prescribed for the job such as safety glasses, safety shoes, and the like. Be sure you know your job and equipment, and never operate a machine without proper au-

thority. Use correct tool speed for the job. Take care of your work area, keeping it neat and orderly. Clean up shavings and oil drippings. Keep tools not being used in a safe place. Use a brush or vacuum to remove chips and turnings. Always shut off the machine for cleaning and adjusting, and when you leave it unattended. Disconnect and lock out power for repairs.
