TRACTOR REVIEW by JIM MALLANEY

February 27, 1973 a line review was held at Bradley on the 1974 and 1975 proposed line of tractors for Sears. The presentation was very successful in that Sears has given us the authority to go out through 1975 on a rooling program.

This is the first time in our history that we have ever been given this much lead time to come up with products requested by Sears.

The line for 1974 will consist of the following models:

1. 8 H.P. recoil lawn tractor

2. All electric start 8 H.P. Lawn Tractor

 New and replacing the 10 H.P. Custom will be a 10 H.P. Lawn tractor with electric start

 12 H.P. Suburban type garden tractor the same as we presently have.

5. 16 H.P. over head valve in the Suburban frame as we presently know it.

16 H.P. twin Onan SS16 as we presently know it.

In addition to this, the line will consist of an all electric operated tractor using a 36 volt system.

The line for 1975 will be as follows:

- A recoil start lawn tractor 8 H.P.
- 2. An electric start 8 H.P. lawn tractor
- 3. 10 H.P. electric start lawn tractor
- New full feature frame tractor which will probably come in 12, 14 and 16 H.P. sizes.
- The top of the line would be a twin cylinder hydrostatic drive tractor also in the same full feature frame.
- 6. The all electric tractor will continue the line.

For 1975 we will also be looking at the possibility of coming up with a hydrostatic drive tractor in smaller horsepowers, perhaps 10 to 12 H.P.

Our Sears customer has congratulated us on an excellent line and as our tractor buyer, Mr. Rawson, has commented we have the finest line oftractors to be had anywhere. We take a back seat to no one and by 1975 we will have surpassed all competition and will be incorporating anti-noise and anti-vibration features in the models at that time.
