COMPANY BENEFITS

New employees become eligible for Group Life Insurance, and Hospital and Medical Benefits after 24 weeks of continuous service. But they are not automatically covered. Just prior to the time each employee becomes eligible, he or she receives a written invitation from Geri Johnson in Personnel to come down and sign up. They have 30 days to do this, but they are not covered until they actually come to Personnel and sign. If after notification an employee fails to sign up within thirty days he or she must wait another 3 months before getting another chance to join.

"DO IT RIGHT THE FIRST TIME" BY NICK GINERIS

It has been quite a while since we have reported on our "Scrap & Rework" costs. We are well into 1973 and we have available the total costs of each category for 1972. Listed below we have a cost comparison summary for the last three years. This summary indicated that our costs are steadily increasing. The only exception to this rising storm of costs is the decrease of our total scrap cost which shows through the storm as a ray of sunshine!

Scrap	\$ 94,773	\$126,295	\$ 88,838
Rework	139,700	146,004	158,434
Total .	\$234,473	\$272,299	\$247,272

For every dollar spent on direct labor to produce our products we are also spending an extra \$.031 for scrap and an extra \$.056 for rework.

For example if we took the total scrap and rework costs for the years, 1970, 1971, and 1972 (\$754,044) and prorated it by the total number of employees (1032) on our active employee file as of January 2, 1973 each employees share of the total cost would be approximately \$728.00.

We mention the above only to illustrate that each employee has a responsibility for our total scrap and rework cost. The total scrap and rework cost for the last three years of \$754,044 is money out of every ones pocket. We, of course, are not naive enough to say that we should never have any scrap and rework. What we are saying is lets do our best in reducing these costs so they are only a small fraction of our operating costs.


