Over a month ago Roper Board Chairman C.M. Hoover announced substantial organizational changes throughout the entire Roper Corporation to take effect January 1, 1974. First, we have a new name. As of January 1 we are now the Roper Outdoor Power Company. For the first time in our seventy years the name Bradley is not officially a part of our title, but it is still our address and will continue to be for what we hope will be at least seventy more years.

From 1967 to 1971 he was with FMC Corp. as General Manager and Allis Chalmers Co. as Vice-President and General Manager. In 1971 he came to the Roper Corporation as Vice-President of Manufacturing Services on the Corporate Level.
