

## CLOSE CALL

Since the advent of OSHA the company has gone to great expense to install safety guarding equipment on the presses in D/15. There has been in some cases great resistance on the part of the operators to this new equipment. Last week an episode occurred that has given some of the grippers a new slant on the situation. AL PONIKVAR of the Tool & Die was adjusting the king pin die on Press #138. This press is equipped with a plexiglass air guard that automatically lowers when the machine is tripped. If anything is in the path of the guard the machine will not trip. AL was having a little trouble and decided to check his work by running one piece on the press. The press repeated and the king pin was dislodged and came at him like a small artillery shell. However the guard stopped it although the force of the impact was so great that the plexiglass was broken. AL figures he was mighty lucky.
