Also our employees have always received blood from the program when needed. Just in the last several months the late Delbert Dexter and Maurice Coffman have been recipients.

However, during the recent months our participation in the program has not been what it should be and Roper Outdoor Products has not been doing its share. Here is the way the program works. Anyone from age 18 through age 60 is eligible to give. Company policy to encourage giving is as follows: plant employees who sign up are either excused one hour early and paid for the hour or, if they go after work, are paid one additional hour of straight time. Appointments should be made through committee members.

After five weeks the race really closed up ranks last night with the "Truckers" taking over first place from the "Welders", by a half point. Here's the standings:


