HARRY started his Bradley career on June 15, 1939 when he was hired as temperary help to take inventory but stayed on as receiving and stores clerk. During this period he joined Local 1212 and still has a withdrawal card. In 1940 he was promoted to the office and helped initiate the first production scheduling procedures, then going to Methods where he helped set up the wartime shell line.
