

Except for the first few months, when he worked for Tony Staniszeski in the basement, his entire career here has been spent in the Machine Shop.

During World War II CLARENCE spent three years in the Army as a combat infantryman. His overseas service was in Europe, and, during the fighting for St. Lo, he was wounded severly by shrapnel causing him to spend $4\frac{1}{2}$ months in the hospital in England and another $3\frac{1}{2}$ months resting and recuperating in Palm Springs, California. The latter was not too hard to take according to CLARENCE. He was honorably discharged as a sergeant.
