VACATIONS

Vacation shutdown this year will be three weeks beginning on Monday July 7 with production scheduled to resume on Monday July 28. Inventory will-begin on Monday, June 30 and continue until the job is finished. As usual production workers are expected to take their vacations during shutdown. Those production workers who have more than three weeks vacation should check with their supervisors in order to schedule the rest of their time. Those who have less than three weeks may get the opportunity to work during part of the shutdown as a list will be posted later.

Service Departments will work during the shutdown as usual. Employees in these departments should see their supervisors as to when their vacations should be scheduled.

RETIREE


