

TETANUS TOXOID

Back in 1969 we started a program of offering Tetanus Toxoid Immunization to all employees who wanted it. This program was entirely voluntary and we were happy to make it available. This means (in plain English) shots were given to make those who received them immune to Tetanus, or as it sometimes is called lockjaw. This program was clearly proved to be effective in World War II and ever since. Today the leading cause of tetanus is the neglected, insignificant wound such as a splinter, that becomes infected.

A complete immunization treatment consists of three doses administered four weeks apart. Thereafter one booster shot is given every three years.

In 1972 booster shots were again given, and now it is time for them to be given again. As a result MRS. RYAN R.N. is planning to have these booster shots given in May at a date to be determined later. For those who received the original treatment only the booster shot is necessary. Those who have never received the treatment can sign up for it if they so desire.

All employees who are desirous of receiving the shots (which are free) are asked to notify the 1st Aid department in the very near future, so the proper amount of serum can be ordered.

SHOEMOBILE

It is not too early to be thinking about the next visit of the Safety Shoemobile which will be Monday, April 28. As usual the unit will be located adjacent to the North guardhouse from 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on that day. This will be the second visit to the plant this year, and the second under the new set up whereby, the company contribution is increased from \$4.00 to \$6.00 per pair. In other words every employee who purchases safety shoes will pay the regular price minus \$6.00 which the company will pay. However, employees are reminded that only two pairs per year can be purchased under this plan. Employees who wish to purchase more than two pairs per year must pay the full price for all purchases after the first two. As usual shoes can be purchased by payroll deduction and paid for in one, two or three weekly payments.
