Medical researchers are taking a long, thoughtful look at high blood pressure and its devastating companion, hypertension. And they've given it a new, but deadly nickname - "The Quiet Killer".

The "Quiet Killer" is fast becoming the Number One public health enemy of the age with medical statistics predicting 200,000 deaths from strokes this year. Hypertension is the leading cause of strokes.

Hypertension is also the major contributor to heart disease. Hardly any part of the body is immune from the effects of hypertension which damages the kidneys, causes impairment of eyesight, and internal hemorrhages.

Because high blood pressure so often goes unnoticed, by those not having regular physical check-ups, Roper is setting in motion a corporation wide plan for all its employees to have their blood pressure checked at no expense or loss of time.

This plant, will be included in the plan with employee participation on a voluntary basis. The blood pressure will be checked by a nurse, a painless procedure taking less than five minutes. If that pressure falls into the normal range for that person's age and weight, he will be told. If there is some abnormality, he will be referred to his family doctor for further checking.

The actual testing will probably begin at Bradley before the end of this week by our nurse probably in the department offices. There will be additional information in next week's issue.


COFFMAN'S 39 won Low Gross in Class A while PFP-IN'S 49 was Low Gross among Class B golfers.


