OLD TIMER OF THE WEEK

One of the most capable and highly regarded employees in his line of work, Inspection, is this week's honored employee VERN SCHNELL who, at the age of twenty, came to work at Bradley on September 16, 1941. Previously he had worked briefly at General Foods. His first assignment here was in the warehouse, but he went to the Foundry, Shell Line on a lathe, and back to the warehouse before going into Inspection in 1952. Presently his job title is Special Assignment Group Leader.

During World War II VERN had an interesting career for 3-1/2 years in the Signal Corps. He was a high speed radio transmitter and during the early part of the war worked with the Navy on the east coast in anti-sub-marine warfare. He was in the room when the original message "Sighted sub-sank same" came in by radio from one of the aircraft involved. VERN later was sent to China with the 1st B-29 squadron under Gen. Curtis LeMay where the 1st Air Strike against Japan was made. Later VERN was sent to the Mariana Islands on Tinian where the 1st Atomic bomb left for Hiroshima. VERN was discharged as a Tech. Sergeant.

The SCHNELL'S, VERN & LUCILLE, have been married 29 years and have a fine family of six children and 5 grandchildren. Faye Anne St. Pierre 29, is married to a C.P.A. who has his own business in Hammond, Ind. Raymond 26, is married and works here in the Tool Room, Michael 25 is living at home and daughter Kathy Storer 22 is married and working at KKK Ind. Supply, Carl 16 is a senior at Eastridge along with daughter Lynne 15 who is a junior.
