




### CONFIDENCE

### LAYOFF SITUATION

As we go to press this week there are still 492 people currently on layoff. Of these 29 are office workers and the remainder are from the plant. At the height of the layoff there were a total of 742 out of the plant which means that 250 have been recalled to work. It is to be hoped that, with business conditions continuing to improve, the rate of recall will be speeded up significantly.

It might be interesting to note that of all the people on layoff 85 are continuing to keep up their insurance. All the rest have either been cancelled out or chose to drop their coverage.
