VOTING

All elections in a free society are important and on March 16 this year an important primary election will take place in Illinois. Unfortunately only a small number of those eligible usually vote and many are not even registered. Through the courtesy of the League of Women Voters we are printing instructions as to proper registration.

RESIDENCE - You may vote in an election after you have lived in the state, county, and precinct for 30 days. You may register up to 29 days before the election.

AGE - You must be 18 years old by the date of the election. If you are 17 years old now, but will be 18 before the election, you may register now.

IDENTIFICATION - You must have proof of residence and proof of age with you when you register. Identification may include driver's license, birth certificate, and other items stating your legal address.

REGISTER IN PERSON - You must register in person the first time. If you move to Kankakee County from another county, you must register in Kankakee County in person.

DEADLINE - You must register at least 29 days before election day if you wish to vote in that election.

ABSENTEE BALLOT - If you will be unable to vote in person, call the County Clerk's office (939-4401) for information about absentee voting.

POLLING PLACE - Polling places will be published in the newspaper. Your precinct number is indicated on the back of your voter registration card.


WHERE TO REGISTER - Register at the County Clerk's office on the main floor of the Court House. Hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. There is no fee and you are not required to state a party preference.

IF YOU MOVE WITHIN KANKAKEE COUNTY - Mail in your voter registration card with your new address on the back. You will be mailed a new card.

IF YOU CHANGE YOUR NAME - If you change your name through marriage or otherwise, you must reregister in person.

IF YOU HAVE NOT VOTED IN THE LAST 4 YEARS - If you fail to vote at least once in four years in a county or general election, the County Clerk's office has the authority to remove your name from the voter registration list. Contact the County Clerk's office to make sure you are still legally registered.

VOTERS REGISTRATION CARD - You will receive a voters card by mail about 2 weeks after you register. If you don't, call the County Clerk's office (939-4401) to find out why. You do not have to show your voter's card when you vote, but it is proof that you are a legally registered voter. Precinct committeemen have been deputized and can register anyone to vote. You may register with any of the committeemen in your precinct.

PARKING LOTS

There have been several thefts from cars in the parking lots lately. As a result the guards are attempting to check out anything suspicious.
