RETIREMENT PROGRAM

In the fall of 1974 we offered a seminar on Preparation for Retirement to all employees 60 years of age and older. The program was held under the auspices of Kankakee Community College who furnished the speakers. The program was held for five consecutive Saturday mornings here at the plant and were attended not only by the employees themselves, but also by their wives or husbands. The subjects discussed were Social Security, Medicaire, Problems of Aging, Comsumer Fraud, and Estate Planning. The program lasted about 1½ to 2 hours each week and the cost was defrayed by the company. And, oh yes, free rolls and coffee were provided at each session.

Again in the spring of 1975 we repeated the program, this time for employees between the ages of 55 and 60. Both of these programs were very well attended and those who did attend felt it was very worthwhile.

Now this year we plan to offer the course again if there is sufficient interest shown by the employees. As a result all employees between the ages of 55 and 65 who did not attend the previous sessions will be receiving letters of invitation to attend this seminar. We urge all to take advantage of the opportunity to learn more about their coming retirement. The program has been funded mainly by Federal Funds which is the main reason the company has been able to take care of the entire cost. We have been told that, effective in June, Federal Funds will be withdrawn and the cost will be almost prohibitive. So this may be the last time we will be able to offer it.
