THE MAKING OF A TRACTOR
Part II

Last week we showed the part that Engineering design plays in the making of a tractor. In Part II we will attempt to show how Engineering and Experimental combine forces to build the prototype. In the picture Model Maker WAYNE COYNE is working on a prototype under the watchful eye of Project Designer DICK FRANKLIN. The model they are working on is an SS 1-10 Tractor which has been projected for production in the fall of '76 as part of the '77 line that will also include 12 and 14 horsepower models.

Experimental has been working on these models for well over a year and at least twenty models will have been built from scratch before these tractors will go into production.

The natural questions that come up are: 1) Are these real working prototypes and, 2) If so what are they used for? The answer is definitely yes they are actual working tractors. As to their use some are, tested extensively, some are used to show and demonstrate to Sears buyers and service people who in turn offer suggestions and some are used for pictures in the catalogues.

Next week we will explore the subject of testing.


