

THE MAKING OF A TRACTOR PART VII POWDER METAL



Two pictures are used to illustrate the Powder Metal function here. Picture No. 1 shows the two compacting presses where the raw material in powdered form is compacted into a "green" part, a gear that must later be sintered or bonded. In its initial stage, after compacting, it is breakable and not functional. Shown in the picture are Set Up Man, CHARLEY BRINKMAN and Operators, JOHN RAIMONDOand WALT DUPUIS. Picture No. 2 shows the sintering furnaces where the green parts are subjected to heat in excess of 2050 degrees fahrenheit for 30 minutes and then taken to our regular heat treat furnaces. JOE DRESS, Supt. of Powder Metallurgy and DICK LAFOND, Operator, are pictured here.

The story of Powder Metal is a fascinating one and began four years ago with the hiring of JOE DRESS and it took three years to purchase the equipment, over \$1,000,000 worth, and set up the program. Production began a year ago, and, since March 18, 1975, over 400,000 gears have been produced, most of them on the first shift. A second shift was added in February of this year. It is interesting to note that during the layoff of last year, Dept 20 went full blast and has doubled the man power since. Since December of 1975, it has been a six day opera-



tion running two shifts on the presses and three on the furnace. Roper has been a pioneer in Powder Metal usage among all competitors in the garden tractor business. The largest users of Powder are the Auto manufacturers, GM, Ford and Chrysler. We use about seventeen pounds of the raw material in a tractor as compared with about fourteen pounds in a Ford Automobile.

The principal saving to us in using Powder Metal in gears is the elimination of a good deal of the waste occasioned by machining solid steel into the required gear sizes. It also enables us to be much less at the mercy of vendors since the raw powder, basically nickel steel mixed with other ingredients to our specifications, is readily available from our supplier HOEGANAES CORP. of New Jersey who according to MR. DRESS, have been extremely cooperative and helpful. We are able to supply 80% of our needs right here and purchase 20% Powder Metal parts from other suppliers.

In addition to what we are already doing in this field MR. DRESS plans through additional tooling to produce parts for the new SSI TRACTOR, as well as spaders and the three point hitch.

PREPARATION FOR THE FUTURE
