

THE MAKING OF A TRACTOR PART VIII INSPECTION

When a tractor manufactured at Bradley eventually winds up in the hands of a customer, some might think that would be the end of our involvement. This is far from the truth. There is a little item called "in-warranty cost" that can really come back to haunt us. Especially if there are non conformances that develop in the tractor during the period when it is under warranty. One of the best ways to reduce in warranty cost is to produce a tractor of such high quality that problems are not apt to develop. To achieve that kind of quality, thorough production control is needed from raw material processing through final assembly.

In order to provide this, the Quality Control Department has been beefed up considerably in the past year and instituted some new features. Twelve new inspectors have been added as well as two supervisors and two non-exempt people. In addition, quality policies and procedures for all departments to follow have been documented and are in the hands of affected personnel.

A new concept called the inspection "cell" has been added to the tractor lines. Located at the end of each of the two tractor lines are quality cells, each one manned by quality inspectors. The picture shows the cells at the end of Line 1. By means of the cells, each and every tractor is subjected to the kind of vigorous inspection testing that should pick up incipient failures.

The Inspectors have the responsibility of inspecting each tractor for conformance to engineering requirements and quality. The engine starting mechanism is checked to verify acceptable safety features. An electronic tachometer is used to check minimum and maximum R.P.M. Other things inspected are brakes, transmission at all gear positions, all electrical features, belts, pulleys, clutch, idler, turning radius, front alignment, tires and proper fitting of parts. If any feature of the tractor is rejected by even one inspector, the unit is repaired by production or set out on the floor where the repairman can correct the problem, after, which the unit is put through the cells again. When a tractor is finally judged to be acceptable the stamp of approval is placed thereon by responsible quality inspectors.

It is hoped that these procedures will result in a significant decrease in, in-warranty costs, which will make us more competitive and increase our sales through having the tractor with the reputation of "Best Quality" in the field.
