THE SILENT KILLER

Those employees who spend much time before their TV sets probably know that the silent killer is high blood pressure. Of late, most TV stations have been running commercials stressing the fact that the reason it is called that is because people who have high blood pressure usually have no symptons to let them know their condition. And yet high blood pressure is probably one of the greatest contributory factors in strokes and heart attacks.

Recognizing this fact and its importance, the Roper Corporation started the first yearly testing program for high blood pressure among all its employees. Last year at Roper Outdoor Products all employees were given the opportunity to have their pressure checked. This year the program will be offered again sometime during the month of June. Naturally, it is voluntary on the part of the employees, but it is certainly to be hoped that all take the opportunity for a free check up.

During 1975 at the time the program was made available, there were 669 employees on the payroll. Of this number 91% or 612 had their blood pressure checked. Of the number checked there were 28 who were found to have moderately elevated blood pressure. However, there were 9 who had significantly elevated pressure and most of them were not even aware of the problem. All of those 9 were immediately referred to their physicians and now, through medication and a program prescribed by the doctor, have the situation well under control.

In succeeding issues, we will give further information as to when, where and how the testing program will be administered.
