OLD TIMER OF THE WEEK

This week's honored employee is WILBUR GUYNN, better known as SKINNY, who came to work at Bradley on July 11, 1944. Born and raised in Southern Illinois, a wide place in the road called Simpson near Vienna, he came north looking for work. His travels took him to Metropolis, Eddyville and Rock Island before coming to the Kankakee area where he worked briefly for Triangle Construction before coming here. Except for a short stay in the Steel Yard his entire career has been spent in the Machine Shop where he currently operates a lathe.

During World War II SKINNY spent a year and a half in the Army as a combat infantryman. Immediately after his basic training he was sent to the European theatre of operations as a member of the 30th (Old Hickory) Division. He was in England, France, Belgium and Germany before being discharged as a PFC.

WILBUR and his wife OPAL have been married thirty years and have one child, a son CLETUS, who works for the Star Oil Co. in Kankakee. However, they were both married once before and each had two children by the previous marriages. SKINNY has a stepson RICHARD, who is an eighteen year career man in the Air Force and step-daughter, DOLORES OUTSEN, living in Limestone. Son, CHARLES is a Supervisor for Star Oil while another son, LESTER lost his life in an automobile accident in 1968.

oKINNY's principal hobby is his grandchildren, twelve in number. He has a five acre estate near Chebanse, aptly called SKINNY's LITTLE ACRES on which he formerly raised ponies and now raises calves. His comment on working here was "if it wasn't the best place to work, I would never have stayed for thirty-two years.
