COUNTY BICENTENNIAL FESTIVAL

Project Engineer BOB BELL is not only a busy man here at the plant, but is also very active away from here. He is the chairman of this event, details of which are as follows:

Three full days of entertainment and activities are scheduled for July 3, 4 and 5th at the Kankakee County Fairgrounds. Events include patriotic exhibits, historical displays, an antique farm machinery parade, sunrise religious services, amateur and professional entertainment, a gigantic flea market, carnival and huge fireworks displays all three nights.

lighlights of the entertainment will be the Bill Anderson Show, the "Po Boys", the Edwardians, Bill Baily's Banjo Band, Paul and Brenda Lasonde, the Crazyhorse Quartet, Kankakee's Municipal Band and the Kankakee Valley Theatre Group who will present "An American Review".

July 3rd will be Kids Day and July 5th Senior Citizen's Day when all Senior Citizens will be admitted for half price.

The Sunrise service on Sunday July 4th will be sponsored by Kankakee's Interfaith Clergy group featuring guest speaker Ex-Congressman Leslie Arends.

It will be remembered that on previous 4ths, the Jaycees sponsored a one day fireworks display at Cobb Park. This years displays that will conclude each night's entertainment will cost over four times the amount spent on previous displays.

Exact times for all special event and entertainment will be published later in the local newspaper.

Daily admission will be \$1.50 for adults and \$.50 for children under twelve. BOB BELL stresses the fact that one admission entitles the person to all special andstand entertainment and shows.


