DEFINING BY NEGATIVES

It is fitting that all Americans celebrate our Bicentennial by a re-examination of what America really is. We have put many great things on paper, and then tried to condense them all into a simple column. We can't get America down on paper that way. Today, we will try by putting down what America is not.

America is not a country which jails its citizens for owning a Bible, holding personal and private faith in God, or attending public worship. America is not a nation which officially penalizes a citizen who does not believe in God or any other deity. The same law which guarantees religious freedom, guarantees freedom from the requirement of having a religious faith.

America is not a country in which political dissent is punished by legal failing or sentencing to death. Political opponents call each other terrible things in the heat of the Primary and sometimes even in the General elections, when it is all over embrace each other on the personal plane while continuing opposition to positions. Resort to violence is not a characteristic of American politics.

America is not a place which jails even its declared enemies for just speaking against the form of government. Communists and socialists are allowed to criticize and even to advocate its overthrow, and we do not touch them until they take overt action to put into effect what they advocate in their speeches. Many Americans believe sincerely that all Presidents who send American soldiers to die in no-win wars should be tried for treason, and they declare it without fear of arrest. Many other Americans believe the foreign policy of Kissinger which, often seemingly benefits the Russians and other Communists, is treason, and they are permitted to say so.

Let us be thankful that we are not a nation which will not permit dissent from official policy. America is a nation with more freedom than any other country in the world.

This is why foreigners have not stopped wanting to live here.
