HOW TIMES CHANGE

Last week we received from JOE GALL D/15 an o yellowed sport page from the Kankakee Republican News dated October 13, 1938. The reason JOE brought it to us was an article about the upcoming important football game between Herscher coached by Emory Bauer and Bradley coached by your Editor and stressing that the opposing coaches had been old rivals in their athletic days at Valporaiso and St. Viator College. We found the story interesting especially since we remembered that the star of that game, which we lost 13-12, was our own JOE DOMINICK. However, we found some other items on that same page even more interesting and unbelievable.

For instance on that date Byron "Whizzer" White was leading all ground gains in the National Football League and at the time the Pittsburg Steelers were paying him a record salary of \$15,000 per year. This is the same Whizzer White who is now a Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court.

Also, The World Champion Chicago Blackhawks were opening training, Bob Zuppke was preparing his U. of Illinois football team for the Notre Dame game, Leo Durocher had just been named manager of the Brooklyn Dodgers and Lou Boudreau (now the radio voice of the Cubs) was playing basketball at the U. of I.

And, oh yes, you could buy a two year old Lincoln for \$645, a one year old Plymouth for \$495, a two year old Chevrolet for \$395 or a three year old Ford for \$295. Times have certainly changed! Except for one thing — the Yankees beat the Cubs in the 1938 World Series in four straight games.
