LARRY POWER, Buyer was President of the Keymen's Club and was burning up the Bradley Bowling League having just bowled a 611 series.


Retiree BILL FLORA was pictured operating his machine in the Machine Shop and was featured as Old Timer of the Month.


CLIFF HENDERSHOTT D/70 and RUSS HUBERT D/93 were pictured crating a garden tractor in the Assembly Department.
