MEDICAL INSURANCE COSTS

Anyone who thinks the cost of Medical Insurance (Hospitalization and Medical) is not increasing by leaps and bounds need only see the figures recently released from The Roper Corporate Office.

Prior to October 1975 the monthly rates paid to All State for active hourly employees at Bradley were as follows:

Class I	(Employee only)	\$23.00
Class II	(Employee and spouse)	\$58.55
Class III	(Family)	\$82.25

Effective 1-1-75 the rates were changed as follows:

Class I	\$34.30
Class II	\$62.20
Class III	\$80.75

We have just received word that, beginning 12-1-76 these are the latest rates.

Class I	\$41.00
Class II	\$74.25
Class III	\$96.40

In other words for single employees the increase in the last two years has been 42%, for a husband and wife 40% and for husband, wife and children 15%.

People have been gradually being recalled from layoff and the number of employees still on layoff is now reduced to less than one hundred.
