SCHOLARSHIPS

Roper Corporation will make available this year 15 college scholarships to sons and daughters of Roper employees at their facilities throughout the United States. The number of scholarships offered each year to talented high school students through the Roper Foundation has been increased this year from 10 to 15. Each is renewable for up to four years of full-time college study.

Winners are determined by competition administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation on the basis of test scores, academic records, leadership and extracurricular accomplishments. The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test and the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (NMSQT and PSAT) are given in public and independent high schools throughout the country during October. This year the tests are scheduled for October 18 and 22 as determined by individual high schools for those students beginning their junior year.

The Roper Scholarships are based on financial need and range from a minimum of \$250 each year to a maximum of \$1500 per year until completion of requirements for a bachelor's degree.

The Roper Foundation Scholarships can be applied to any accredited college in the United States for study in any field which ultimately leads to a bachelor's degree. High school juniors who are sons and daughters (natural or legally adopted) of Roper employees throughout the country are eligible to compete for these awards.
