Following the game there was a short entertainment during which Bill Dressler played his harmonica -guitar combination, the Misses Rantz (Clarence's daughter's) played accordions, Miss Hasemeyer (Fritz's daughter) sang, and the Bisping boy and girl danced. The entertainment was well received and the dance followed immediately, lasting until midnight. Altogether, it was an extremely enjoyable evening and a fitting celebration of the months of effort which finally won for us the "E" award. ROLL OF HONOR!!

The following article concerning Pvt. Fred Martin, formerly of the tool & die department, at David Bradley, appeared in the Chicago Tribune of 12/11/44.

"Pvt. Fred Martin, of Bradley, Illinois, had to be a three-gun man to hold a German counter attack near a little Alsatian village he had just helped liberate. The enemy struck at Martin's outpost and overran a machine gun position. He fired his carbine until he ran out of ammunition. Spying a German rifle some distance away, he ran across the open space, sized the weapon and emptied it at the enemy. There was just one available weapon in sight now, the armored machine gun which the Germans had raced past. Bullets streamed past him as Martin made a dash for that gun. He raised it, swung around, and kept it firing until reinforcements came up and aided him in disrupting the counter thrust."

We are at once proud and humble in the face of such heroic bravery in one of whom we recall as a fellow worker. Items such as these give point and meaning to our daily work and help us to realize

that the war is not merely the distant unheard thunder but a personal and a real thing that is touching, destroying, or sometimes glorifying the lives of men and women whom we know and love.

In closing we hope and trust that you had a Merry Christmas as your individual circumstances permitted, you were much in the thoughts of us here at home during this holiday season. Somehow it was not quite the holiday with so many of you away. Our wish for you and for all of us in the New Year is for a victorious 1945, which will bring all of you back to us so that we can meet and conquer the problems of the coming peace together, secure in the knowledge that in our combined and happy efforts we cannot fail to fashion the world we are fighting for.
