The stale bread delusion costs the consumer as well as the baker a great deal of money. It is foolish besides, when bread is first baked it contains 30 per cent of moisture. After a time some of this water escapes. The bread dries out, or as the baker says, 'goes stale.'' As a matter of fact the bread isn't stale, it is just as wholesome, just as sweet, just as satisfactory as the moment to left the oven, and every loaf that is returned to the bakers to be fed to horses by that much increases the cost of bread.

Since I last had the pleasure of talking to the Indiana bakers we have made several studies in our laboratories which are of interest to you. We spent nearly a year studying the keeping qualities of bread. We have determined the daily loss in moisture, the change in food value, the difference in flavor. Bread three days old, when properly kept, is fost as good as when a day old. Why shouldn't it be? Bread baked in the home is always used up before the next baking. It does not dry out because it is wrapped and placed in a bread box where its moisture, content is conserved. The average housewife does? SOWING ALFALFA ON WELL-TILLED SOILS

Seedbed Should Be Prepared Year or Two Before Planting -Plow Early and Deep.

—Plow Larry and Deep.

By PROF. M. A. BEESON, Okishoma A. and M. College, Stillwater).

In preparing the seedbed for sifulfayou should begin a year or two before you wish to seed by planting a cut cultivated and free from weeds. Corn is a good crop to precede aifaifa. The critical period of affaifa is the first six weeks of the life of the plant. The ground should be plowed early and deep. It should be free from weeds seed. It should be well tilled, but firm up to the surface when seed-ed. Subpacking with a disk harrow with disks set straight is an excellent practice. Fall seeding in September without a nurse crop is considered the

From 12 to 15 pounds of seed per-acre is ample if the seed is cienn and strong. When it is sown with a grain dill attachment on well prepared seed-bed, and when sown earefully and not too deep, from ten to twelve pounds of seed is quite sufficient. The seed is small and does not need to be sown too deep, just so you get it into the most dirt.

Early Hatching Brings Winter Eggs

Washington, D. C., Jan. 13—Early hatching is the secret of winter egg production, say specialists in the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The pullet that is hatched early matures early and is ready to lay eggs in the fall when the supply is scarcest and pricest highest. Chickens; that are expected to be revenue producers for their owners later in the year, should be out of their shells by April 30 at the latest. If they are properly cared for thereafter they will begin to lay eggs at the very time that eggs are most wanted.

NEW METHOD OF MAKING SERUM

Specialists Find Way to Produce a Clear Sterilized Product Free From Foot and Mouth Virus

A new, method of preparing anti-hog eholora serum, which permits the economical production of a clear iterilised broduct, has just been described in the Journal of Agriculture. The advantage claimed for the new method is that it makes possible the production of an anti-hog cholora serum which can be quickly storilized by heat to a point that will absolutely hill any germs of foot and mouth disease and as yield a secure that it absolutely safe of the secure of

tracted contained so row, if any, of these valuable bodies as to make the residue of red cells useless in preventing the disease.

Before the clear serum was developed, many attempts were made to sterilize by heat in a practicable way the ordinary delibrinated blood. It was found, however, that heating the old product up to 60 degrees Centigrade resulted in more or less complete coagulation of the defibrinated blood and in the destruction of the serum so far as its commercial worth is concerned. It was found that the highest temperature that could be used was 50 degrees centigrade and it was necessary to keep the old aroum at this temperature for twelve hours to make certain that the virus of foot and mouth disease was killed. Heating serum at a steady temperature over this long period of ordinary practice is difficult and too expensive.

Attempts also were made to make a clear serum by centrifugalizing. It was found, however, that while the centrifuge would separate to some gx tent the red cells, they were in such shape that it was difficult to separate the serum completely. An important quantity of antibodies were left behind in the red cit, and the resulting product was a cloudy rather than a clear serum. With this process was discovered by the Federal serum, moreover, can be completely sterilized in 30 minutes, whereas the old serum had to be heated steadily for 13 hours.

The new form of serum as far as the Department knows is not yet being made or put on sale by the commercial serum laboratories. As 'this process was discovered by the Federal government, any one in the United States is free to use it.
