



How Needles are Made

How Needles are Made

The steel wire from which needles are made is cut into proper lengths, and these are put into the furnace, acter which they are rolled perfectly straight. Next they pass to the "beedle pointer," who takes a dozen or so, rollings them between his thumb and finger, with their ends on a grinding stone. When pointed, they are put into a machine that flattens and gutters the heads, instly punching the eyes. The result is a complete needle, but one that is rough and easily bent. By a process of heating and sudden cooling, they are given the proper tempeling them polish, 5,000 needles are spread out on coarse cloth with emery dust, oil and soft soap strewn over them. The cloth is tightly rolled and thrown into a pot, where it is kept in constant motion for twelve lours. The last process consists of washing and drying the needles, making them ready for sorting and packing.


