PRESENT WALL OF STEEL TO ENEMY

American Soldiers Will Be Armed to Teeth When They Go Into Trenches.

BAKER GIVES OUT DETAILS

One Hundred and Ninety-Two Gunt and 480 Trench Knives Added to Equipment of Each Regiment in Reorganization.

Washington,—American soldiers will be diterally armed to the teeth when they go into the trenches. In addition to the usual rifles, bayo-nets and pistois with which the men are now armed, there will be added to the flighting equipment of each regi-ment 480 trench knives, 40 to euch company; 192 maching guns, 16 to eich company, and three one-pound cannon.

Details of the men's fighting equip-ment were given in a statement by Secretary of War Baker, outlining the new army organization for overseas

Secretary of War Baker, outlining the new army organization for overseas service.

27,152 Men in Division.

The new organization increased the ratio of artillery to infantry from three to nine, as at present, to three to four. A corresponding increase is made in machine gun strength. In addition, there are sections of suppers. The strength of the new organizations will be: Divisions, 27,152; infantry brigade, 8,201; artillery brigade, 5,068; infantry company, 256, and machine gun company, 178.

Each infantry regiment will have a strength of 160 officers and 3,652 men. There will be one headquarters, and a headquarters company of 313; three buttailing 3,075; one supply company of 140, one machine gun company and one medical detachment of 56.

The rifle company has 250 men and six officers, It is composed of a company headquarters and two officers of 20 men, and one section of tilemen of 12 each, or 24 men; one section of bombers and rifle greandlers of 21 men, and one section of the machine gun company ille armed with 12 heavy machine guns and four spare guns.
