

Sarah Ann's Cooking Class

In the South rice is served often, few foods have as dainty a flavor. It has about the same food value as white flour, cornmeal or macaroni. Rice blends ideally with vege tables, meats, eggs, cheese, fruit and milk. The most important of all rice dishes is boiled rice as it is the basis of most rice recipes, therefore it is important that the cook knows how to properly cook rice before attempting any rice re-

Boiled Rice

Wash the rice in cold water several times. Have ready boiling water—8 times as much water as rice-adding one teaspoon salt to each quarter of water. Add rice to the water slowly, taking care not to let the water stop boiling. Let other members of the social cook undisturbed for 25 minutes or until the rice is tender. When done empty the rice in a colander and may have, he is far from educated pour hot water through it until the grains separate. Drain, place the colander in the saucepan. Cover with a clean towel and let stand on the back of the stove 5 to 10 minutes.

Chicken and Rice en Casserole

1 green pepper shredded 2 cups cooked rice

1 1 2 cups chopped cooked chick-

14 teaspoon salt—paprika

1 cup milk

13 cup bread crumbs. Saute green pepper in a little shortening until tender but not brown. Put a layer of cooked rice in bottom of greased casserole. Cover with a layer of chicken and green pepper. Repeat layers until all is used. Season with salt and paprika and pour milk over all. Cover top with crumbs and dots of butter. Bake in an oven 350 degrees for 15 minutes.

Creamed Eggs with Chili and Rice

To two cups of well seasoned medium white sauce, add 1 teaspoon chili powder and 6 hard boiled eggs cut in quarters. Meanwhile, cook one cup of rice, season it and arrange it in a border around a platter. Pour egg mixture in the center.

Creole Rice

Have hot 1 cup of cooked rice, Melt 4 tablespoons bacon fat, add 1 2 cup sliced onlon, 1 2 cup dried celery and 1 green pepper shreded. Cover the pan and cook slowly for 10 minutes. Add 1|4 of a clove of garlic, 3 cups canned tomatoes, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1 teaspoon salt and a little pepper. Cook slowly for 25 minutes, thicken with 2 tablespoons flour mixed with a little cold water and stir into the rice. Mix lightly with a fork and turn

Rice Croquettes

2 cups cooked rice 3 4 teaspoon salt

3 tablespoons milk

1 egg, beaten

z cup grated Cayenne
