SAVINGS THEORY DISCREDITED BY · NATIONAL FORUM

(From The Townsend Weekly) For generations we Americans have been taught that saving a portion of our earnings is a wise and necessary policy. Now the National Forum issues a chart on savings that challenges our reasoning along this line. Either we tem has changed so capidly within the past twenty years that we must now make a new approach to

The National Forum chart reveals that in 1929 fifteen billion ioliars was sayed, and that of this mly five billions was spent for new, nvestment. This left some ten bilion dollars saved—or out of cirshould be distributed to a differculation. So in 1929 there was ten pillion dollars lying idle.

Production Cut.

Now if only five billion dollars ould be invested in the manufacaire of new goods, this meant that n 1929 we had so much goods on and that we had to out down proluction. With goods flooding the narket, manufacturing slowed lown, unemployment spread—the Freat Depression arrived.

If surpluses had not accumulatd on the market, more than merey five billions could have been invested in manufacturing new foods. Instead of ten billion idle lollars there would have been ten illions more in dirculation. But he surpluses accumulated because to one would buy them.

Yet in 1929 there were millions d Americans greatly in need of hese goods. There was also ten illion dollars in the banks that ould have been spent for them. Infortunately, only a handful of ersons owned the ten billions aved. And the needs of this hand ul were well taken care of by noney they did not save.
