## The History of Bradley High School

The first school district for this territory was organized in 1893. Prior to this time, the public school for the present Bradley was located in Bourbonnais. Following the platting of North Kankakee in 1891, the school district followed and in 1895 became the present Bradley School district.

In 1941 the High School district was changed from district No. 68 to No. 307, and became known as the Bradley - Bourbonnais Community High School.

The first school building of this district was constructed in 1894 as a unit of our present school. Before this, school was conducted in an old store building on South Washington Ave.; later in the Methodist Church and the Woodman building. In 1898 the first frame school building was remodeled.

In 1911 an adjoining brick building was constructed and in 1913 was increased to its present size.

The first high school was established in 1898 by Professor Sutton, but was discontinued in 1903. Established again in 1909, by Professor Hartleb, there was a graduating class of two students. The enrollment steadily increased to its all time high of 220 in 1943.

Professor Hartleb was succeeded by Professors Robinson, McDougall. A. J. Weiland (who later became State Supt. of Public Instruction), R. P. Welker, R. E. Hall (present County Supt. of Schools), and our present, Mr. Honn.

In 1928 our present gymnasium was constructed. Coach O. W. Young was Basketball, Football and Track Mentor during that period and previous to that time, athletic practice for indoor sports had been held in various buildings on Broadway. Our athletic teams progressed to reach the highest point in their career with our entrance into the State High School Basketball tournament in 1939 under Coach Laffey's leadership.

In 1942 a new football field was put into use at the future site of our proposed High School.

Curriculum additions during the past decade have included courses in Aeronautics, Physics, Metal Works, Geography, Speech Arts, and Music Appreciation. The largest graduating class was in 1942 when a total of 44 members received their diplomas.

Plans were begun for a new Community High School several years ago but were deferred until Peace makes possible further construction activities.
